The Kingdom of God Vs. Kingdom of Heaven

The term 'kingdom of God' and 'kingdom of Heaven' are used interchangeably in the gospels. They are not different kingdoms. Kingdom of Heaven is used 32 times and only in the book of Matthew. Kingdom of God is used 70 times in the New Testament; 5 times in the book of Matthew. Whenever Mark and Luke record the same incident as Matthew, they use the term kingdom of God where Matthew used the term kingdom of Heaven.

The kingdom of God is not physical but spiritual (Luke 17:21). Both John and Jesus said that the kingdom of God was close (Matthew 3:2, Mark 1:15). Yet when Jesus preached the sermon on the mount, taught his disciples or any of the parables he told; they were not to people who were part of the kingdom of God. To prove this Jesus said that the kingdom of God is not far from you and that some would not die until they saw it (Mark 9:1). Jesus tells us (John 14:2) 'I go to prepare a place for you'. Satan has many ways of deceiving us, but two obvious ones are changing the Word of God and changing the meaning of words. Merriam Webster 1828 dictionary defines 'place' as 'a way of admission, or transit'. Jesus then says he is the way (John 14:6). David says he will praise Gods' word (Psalms 56:10), hope in his word (Psalms 119:81) and that His word is settled forever in Heaven (Psalms 119:89). The book of John begins by saying 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God' (John 1:1). The first chapter of John states that Jesus is that "Word". Jesus says that if He with the finger of God cast out devils, no doubt the kingdom of God is come upon you' (Luke 11:20). The kingdom of God includes all those who have had righteousness imputed unto them (Romans 4:22)(Luke 13:28, Matthew 8:11). Righteousness defined by Noah Webster 1828 dictionary is 'the cause of our justification', which is Jesus Christ. Jesus says to seek a righteousness that only comes from God (Matthew 6:33). Paul says that Jesus has been made our wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption (1 Corinthians 1:30,31).

In the sermon on the mount when Jesus lists all these things that we have to be better than, He is not meaning that we are to strive to live blamelessly, but that whatever we do will never be good enough: only His righteousness will suffice (Matthew 6:33). The kingdom of God was "among them" but could not remain until Jesus returned to the Father and the Holy Spirit returned to be upon each believer (John 16:7). The sermon on the mount is found in Matthew 5-7 and Luke 6. Jesus was with his disciples but spoke to everyone (Matthew 7:28-29, Luke 6:27 & Luke 7:1). Jesus makes some really tough claims to live by, which if taken by themselves would give you a twisted theology. Both in Matthew and in Luke he concludes those claims by putting them in perspective. In all things, consider, if it was you who presented the request to someone you love, would you expect it to be complied with, and if so; do the same, not only to those you love but to your enemies also (Matthew 7:12 & Luke 6:31). When Jesus says to be perfect as your Father is perfect (Matthew 5:48), it means whole-hearted with God, not without sin because that would be an impossible request. Jesus said that some of them would not die until they saw the kingdom of God come with power (Mark 9:1). Paul says that the kingdom of God is not in word, but in power (1 Corinthians 4:20).

Jesus said that (Matthew 7:21) 'Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven'. He says that (Matthew 7:22-23) '22Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity'. Therefore Jesus is saying that by imitating Jesus we can look like we are a part of the kingdom of God but that he never knew us.

The kingdom of God is not what we do but what the Holy Spirit does in us (1 Corinthians 4:20). If you plant a fruit tree in poor soil with minimal water, it will never produce fruit. On the other hand if the tree is planted in optimum soil conditions that has adequate moisture and appropriate pruning, the tree will have an abundance of fruit. If we study Gods' word (2 Timothy 2:15) and get to know him, as the Holy Spirit works (Philippians 2:13) within us, we will display the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23). This

fruit is not the actions we do like visiting the sick or feeding the poor or other social justice programs: those are just our reasonable service (Romans 12:1). Each tree will produce the variety of fruit (Luke 6:43-44) it was designed to produce, just as God has created each of us differently (1 Corinthians 4:7).

The kingdom of God is not about living to a certain set of standards and making disciples of others to do the same. It is about believing (Acts 8:37) that Jesus, the son of God, shed his blood for your sins by being crucified, dying and then overcoming death by arising from the dead and then personally accepting that payment on your behalf (Ephesians 3:17). You will then receive the gift of the Holy Ghost (Acts 2:38) who will the work within you (Philippians 2:13) to produce much fruit (Ephesians 5:9). This gift will then teach us (1 John 2:27) as we study His Word (Hosea 6:6). We become his disciples (John 8:31) if we study his Word (2 Timothy 2:15) and in obedience apply it to our lives (John 14:15, 15:10). We are then to share this good news with all the world (Matthew 28:18-20).
